Opening Opportunities during a pandemic

National Youth Science Forum

The National Youth Science Forum is another Rotary-supported program that has had to adapt during these interesting times! This program for Year 12 students of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) is traditionally held across three programs in Canberra and Brisbane during January. In 2021, the program will be held online over two weeks (5 -22 January), with some localised inperson events. Late in November, I participated in an online orientation for the students in our district who have been selected to participate. Congratulations to these students, and thank you to the Rotary Clubs that have sponsored them.

Australia Day Grants

Also during November, we sprang into action at short notice to apply for National Australia Day Grants for four clusters across the district, in order to run Australia Day events in our communities, in line with the Centenary of Rotary in Australia, . All applications were successful - thank you to those Rotarians who undertook to complete the applications. I look forward to finding out more about the planned events in each locality.

Membership

At the end of November, we received advice that our District's membership numbers had grown by 55 since the start of the Rotary year - the second highest membership growth of all districts in Zone 8 (Australia and New Zealand). That's the good news! The disappointing news is that, this figure should actually be higher, by about 12-15 members! The reason it wasn't higher was because these members had not had their member data recorded in MyRotary by the time of the report! Keep up the great work at attracting new members, but please ensure these members have their joining date acknowledged by entering their data as soon as possible after their induction (and no longer than 30 days after).

Disease Prevention and Treatment Month

December is the month that we, across the Rotary world, focus on our efforts to combat diseases and health education, because prevention is just as important. In this newsletter, there is more news of clubs





ORDER IN THE COURT!

The Rotary Club of Darwin proved that club meetings can be interesting, different, and fun, when, instead of a dinner meeting at their usual venue, they recently visited the Supreme Court where a mock trial took place.

As Club Bulletin Editor, John Hardy reports:

It was a night to remember as we witnessed a mock trial of a man who had assaulted an elder. We were in one of the Supreme Courtrooms, presided over by a real judge with a real prosecuting barrister, and the accused defended by another real barrister (photo below left). The accused was not a real offender (the role was play-acted by Rotarian Andrew Pinnell). We may have witnessed a mock trial, but it was based on an actual case, with the names, dates and circumstances changed to protect the innocent and guilty involved. Those who attended the "trial", Rotarians and invited guests, were all invited to participate in two interrogations, first, how to determine 'Bail' and under what criteria, and what prerequisites; second after witnessing 'the trial' what sentence would we impose if there was a guilty verdict, for how long, would there be parole and when, and other considerations.

The audience was very engaged in deliberations and nearly everyone became involved in getting the

decision and all the factors that were taken into consideration. A very interesting side of our community's activities; few of us realized how complicated trials are and what is at stake to get it right. Fortunately, it was revealed that a very compassionate attitude was evident in the court proceedings and the accused was given a very fair outcome. Some of us were pretty hard with our sentencing and we would have the jails full in no time.

Lucky for Andrew he was able to join us afterwards in a very tasty supper, washed down in true Rotary fashion with plenty of beer and wine at reasonable prices (photo below right). It was a privilege to be able to do what we did, attend the re-enactment of an actual trial, in the court in which it had been held and again with the same legal team.





APPEAL TO REPLACE BUS FOR CANCER PATIENTS

Group 3 Rotary Clubs have instigated a project to replace the aging bus used by Gluyas Lodge, an accommodation facility for cancer patients, to transport the patients to the Townsville University Hospital from the facility in North Ward, Townsville. The current vehicle is around ten years old and travels about 30,000 kilometres per year doing this work, consequently it is nearing the end of its serviceable life. The people that it transports are usually many miles from home and are facing an uncertain future.

On behalf of the Group 3 Clubs, Rotary Thuringowa Central President, Neil Klein, applied for a grant to help fund this project through the Rotary Australia World Community Service (RAWCS) "Compassionate Grants" program. Neil has now received approval for a subsidy of \$15,000 on a dollar for dollar basis to help this project
